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Nine Inducted Into Hall of Fame

Eight current and former Park Forest residents who made significant and longlasting contributions to the community through the years and the Illinois Philharmonic Orchestra were inducted into the Park Forest Hall of Fame April 23, 2017. This year's group of honorees includes:

- **Peg and Jack Donahue**, who contributed to education, the arts and local government, Junior Chamber of Commerce, internet education, Cable television and SCORE.
- Carl and Peggy Glassford, who were in Tall Grass Arts Association, League of Women Voters, local government and establishing Thorn Creek preserve and Old Plank Trail.
- William "Bill" and Juanita Simpson who founded Far South Suburban and Park Forest chapters of the NAACP, and passionately advocated against Integration Maintenance.
- **Herschel W. and Helen D. Ward,** who helped found Good Shepherd Protestant Church, Rich Township Food Pantry, and volunteered for numerous community groups.
- Illinois Philharmonic Orchestra which began in May 1955 as Park Forest Symphony Orchestra, changing its name in 1982.

<u>Visit the 1950s Park Forest House Museum</u> This Summer with Family and Friends

October 28, 2017 will mark the 70th Anniversary of the groundbreaking of Park Forest.

Step back that 70 years with a visit to the 1950s Park Forest House Museum, 227 Monee Road—open Wednesday and Saturday from 1-3:30 p.m.; or for small groups by appointment. Admission is \$5 for adults; ages 12 & under are free with an adult. A wonderful inter-generational experience, and stimulating for those with memory loss.

Located inside St. Mary's Catholic Church, it represents an original rental unit, 1948-1953. Park in the small lot with flagpole and knock on the classroom door next to the museum sign in the window.

Learn the history of the village and social and fashion trends in the first five years of occupancy. See toys, clothes, furniture, books, records, dolls, dishes and appliances. Photographs-including several telling the story of construction of the 3010 original rental units, scrapbooks, and sales brochures from the Archive are on display. The Local History File Cabinets with over 270 subject files, and the "OH! Park Forest" oral history transcripts are in the museum for you to read and research your questions; also available for research by appointment.

"Boomer Toys" Exhibit Being Considered

Museum Director, Jane Nicoll is planning to mount an exhibit of Boomer Toys and dolls covering the years from 1950 through the early 1960s. She hopes to be able to begin adding toys, dolls and labels to the museum in June. The exhibit will include several 8 inch dolls which appeared in the Dolls of the 1950s exhibit, in addition to dolls who have remained in the museum since that exhibit. The museum already has many Boomer Toys on display, but we hope to borrow others from the public which would be on loan for the length of the exhibit. If you have not visited for a while, you may enjoy coming now to see how many metal vehicles we have, along with a Cooties game and more!
