We Celebrated Our 41st Anniversary with "Revisiting Utopia" at Freedom Hall

On January 30, 2026, the Society turned 41 years old. Jane Nicoll is the only remaining founder, though Neal Ney, former Library Director who encouraged the founding and library involvement is still living. On January 31st we celebrated with more than 200 current and former Park Foresters who attended an event we sponsored, a public viewing of the documentary film, "Revisiting Utopia".

The film was produced by Revisiting Utopia group, directed by former resident, Phil Rockrohr. The film consists of interviews and narrative on the experiences of people who grew up in Park Forest from 1959-1990. The team found and interviewed Park Forest's first black family and head of that family Charles Z. "C.Z." Wilson, who came on December 24, 1959 to break the color barrier. Mr. Wilson passed soon after. It tells the story of how Harry Teshima, a former resident of a WWII Japanese internment camp set out to integrate Park Forest and to fight racism, and told how others in the Village helped.

Author of America's Original GI Town, Gregory Randall, does a video segment. Don DeMarco former assistant manager of Park Forest in charge of overseeing integration efforts, speaks.

There are interviews with black and white adults who grew up going to Park Forest schools and how they perceived integration and the desegregation of schools here. Originally thinking he was documenting a Utopian situation, Phil soon realized that not all of the black students were treated as well as hoped. His group had not realized how much the peaceful integration had been "engineered" by something which in the 70's became labeled, "Integration Maintenance."

Overall, in spite of initial disillusionment, those interviewed were proud of how the integration in Park Forest was managed, producing an outcome that even those who had bad experiences felt produced a fairly positive place to grow up.

The film was enthusiastically received by the audience.

Both Jane Nicoll and President Chris Janota made appeals to the audience to join the Society in "Saving Your History", to become involved in programs the Society holds, becoming members and supporting our efforts to disseminate Park Forest history. Chris pointed out that THEIR stories were as much history as those of the pioneer families and that we want them to share their stories with us.


The Society Board is proud to have supported the making of this film. Jane Nicoll was very involved in supplying materials, photographs and information to the team throughout production.

I am beginning to make moves toward packing. Since another church has expressed interest in the building, we know our days are numbered in St. Mary's. We have moved the museum, alone, three times with more minor moves of things in and out of storage over the 27 years the museum has existed.

The Local History and Archive Collection was moved and morphed within the Library while it was there from 1981 to 2026, then moved in parts to and from storage, into museum nooks and crannies, then in whole to St. Mary's in January 2012. The Local History Collection and the public copies of the oral histories came to the museum from the library in about 2017.

We know how to pack it and move the collections. There is just much more in both collections than in earlier moves.

We Have a New Home for Our Archive, Office and for our Museum

As we told you last year in February, we had just heard that the Joliet Diocese was closing our home, St. Mary's Catholic Church. By March, 2025, under the leadership of outgoing Village Manager, Tom Mick, the Society was offered the former Nurse's Plus space in the lower level of Village Hall. Negotiation of an agreement has been slowly ongoing. We are now at a stage of simply ironing out the "legalese" of the agreement before signing.

Current Village Manager, Jon Kindseth, who came on June 16, 2025, is now on board with our being in the space, and we hope to sign as soon as the Village approves legal language suggested by our attorney for the protection of both entities.

As a considerable blessing to us, Joliet Diocese, three weeks before we were to vacate, knowing we had a pending agreement, offered us an extension to our lease for the St. Mary's spaces. We literally had nowhere to go except for storage. Been there, done that. St. Mary's since our very first encounter with them and throughout our occupancy has been responsive to our needs and generous in their cooperation with us. We now deal with Father Thomas Milotta, pastor of St. Liborius and St. Boniface, who has been understanding of our predicament.

We were delighted to have been able to put up our Christmas/Hanukkah display once more, and had hoped to put out the Valentine display which we love so much in St. Mary's. Just as we had discussed it while packing up Christmas, we discovered that the current snow on the roof was once again leaking in on the collection via ice melting over the gutters onto the flat roof under the peaked roof. The leak wasn't big, yet, but we can't risk the collection and the museum is currently entirely covered in plastic sheeting. So no Valentine's Day this year. Yours truly is very sad about this.

It will take time for us to alter the space in Village Hall to accommodate our collections. The Society will pay for the renovations. Rent for the space is very reasonable.



We are planning to hold our Ice Cream Social at Village Hall and may or may not be able to show you how we are progressing with our move.

Join us Sunday, February 22, 2026, 2:30 p.m. in Park Forest Village Board Meeting Room, 350 Victory Drive, for a presentation by Dr. Larry A. McClellan, author and scholar on the Underground Railroad. This program is free and open to the general public.



Dr. Larry McClellan is presenting his ongoing studies of the Underground Railroad and freedom seekers who passed through Northern Illinois and Indiana en route to Canada.

Dr. McClellan began his early studies in Illinois and then extended his research to Northwest Indiana. Recently, he has extended his research to the South Bend region.

A nationally recognized scholar on the subject, from right in our own backyard, he has written several books, *The Underground Railroad South of Chicago*, 2019; *To the River*, 2019; and *Onward to Chicago: Freedom Seekers and the Underground Railroad in Northeastern Illinois*, 2023; and numerous other publications. Copies of his book will be available for sale at our program.

His research resulted in Crete being named to the National Park Service Network to Freedom register of the Underground Railroad. The McCoy Farmstead site along Sauk Trail, just east of Western Avenue is also a verified site, which we hope will be included at a later date, as the McCoy's worked with the Congregational Church in Crete. For the time being the national support of the Network to Freedom is suspended. Governor Pritzker and the State of Illinois have initiated support of the program until reason returns.

In 1970, McClellan completed his doctoral studies at the Divinity School at the University of Chicago. He previously studied at Occidental College in Los Angeles and the University of Ghana in West Africa.

Also in 1970, McClellan helped to start Governors State University, south of Chicago, where he taught for 30 years. He is emeritus Professor of Sociology and Community Studies.
